

INSIDE LOOK FROM OUR FINANCIAL SECRETARY

This month's installment of "Inside Look" features Receiving Moneys and Ordering Payments. This is just one part of a recurring article series that seeks to expose everyone in the council to the work of a Financial Secretary. Please feel free to contact me at marcus.ritosa@gmail.com if you have any clarifying questions.

When receiving any money on behalf of the council, the Financial Secretary must consider some basic things: Where is this money coming from? What is its intended purpose? With this information in hand, the Financial Secretary is able to process the checks and cash in a simple spreadsheet and Supreme's online accounting system. After they are processed, the Treasurer then deposits the funds as directed.

When asked to order money to be disbursed (and a check written), the Financial Secretary must consider some basic things: How much is being requested? Where in the budget is this being paid from? To whom should it go? How will it get to the intended recipient? What backup documentation exists for this request? The answers to each of these questions provide the basic, necessary elements for issuing funds, as well as for recording and coding the transaction. Thankfully, a simple spreadsheet and Supreme's online accounting system hold all of these pieces of data that enable quick and efficient financial reporting. Checks are written at the monthly Business Meeting (2nd Tuesday of the month) or by special request.

Each year in our council, the Financial Secretary orders about 100 checks written, and receives about 300 individual payments. At the end of each month, the Financial Secretary verifies all checks cashed and deposits made that month. If all is well, it's



Between Dale, Norbert and myself, we probably had 3 dozen discussions about the Knights of Columbus with parents, grandparents, aunts, and uncles. The Million Dollar Knights of Columbus bills were also given out as prizes, to be redeemed for a free Pancake Breakfast.

At times, during the night, Norbert and I had our hands full, happily flipping and catching pancakes with the kids. We sure could have used a few more Knights to interact with the parents during the "busy" times.

APRIL PANCAKE BREAKFAST

In April of this year, our OLF parish changed their Sunday morning mass schedule. We went from 4 masses (7am, 8:30am, 10am & 11:30am) to three masses (7am, 9am & 11am). Before the changes, our council would put on our monthly pancake breakfast after the 7am, 8:30am & 10am masses. With the changes, we decided to only serve breakfast after the 7am & 9am masses. We knew that some of the original 8:30am goers would switch to 7am and some to 9am. We also knew that some of the original 8:30am and 10am goers would switch to the 9am mass. What we didn't know is to what extent the parishioners would elect to attend our breakfast.

In addition to our normal breakfast menu (scrambled eggs, sausage, pancakes and hash browns), we added Perogies (a dough dumpling stuffed with potato and cheese), Kielbasa (sausage) & Sauerkraut to provide the people with a Polish styled cuisine. What we found out is that we served more people under the new mass hours compared to the old. Our Grand Knight had predicted the increased attendance and purchased more supplies to make sure we could serve everyone who showed up. In the end, we only had a few pancakes and sausages left over and we received great reviews about the polish food. In fact, we ran out of Perogies and Kielbasa & Sauerkraut before we could serve everyone coming through the line after the 9am mass!

If you worked the breakfast, "thank you" for your time and effort in making the activity a big success. We netted \$536 which will be donated to Habitat for Humanity.

EDITORIAL "CHARITY ON THE MICRO SCALE"

I have been reflecting on the incredible things the Knights of Columbus do, not only as a world-wide organization of Catholic Gentlemen supporting our first pillar, Charity, but more specifically on Our Lady of Fatima Council #9597. On the Macro Scale, of course, Council #9597 supports Seminarians and Novitiates, Parish Events, Food Ministries, Culture of Life Ministries, to wit., the ultrasound machine initiative, Sporting Events such as the K of C Free Throw contest, the "Keep Christ in Christmas" poster contest, the OLF School Essay contest for eighth grade students, and the monthly pancake breakfasts that help many different charities. We can debate whether these actions are a result of our Christian faith, following the teaching of Christ, or supporting our Knights of Columbus pillars of Charity, Fraternity, Unity, and Patriotism. Bottom Line, it gets done. The elixir, like all things from God, in my personal opinion is made from many ingredients. I am proud to be associated with such a group! No names. No excuses!
